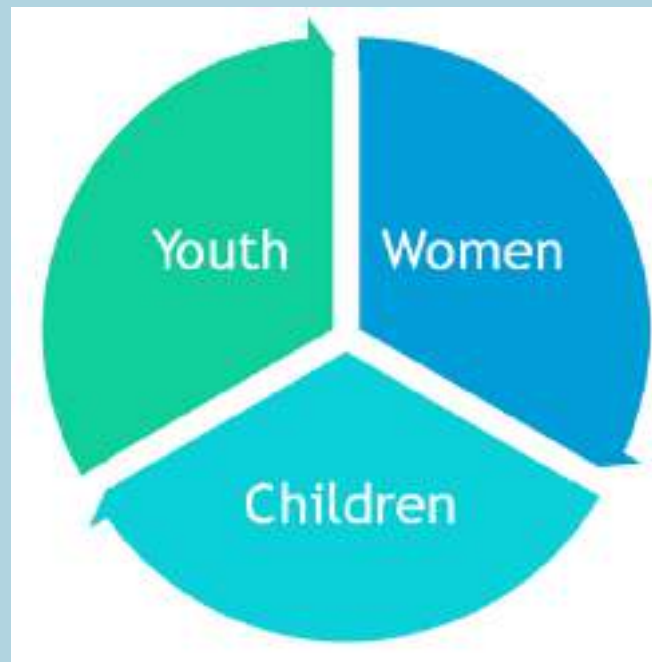

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

THEMATIC AREA: SOCIAL COHESION SDG 16



- *Small-scale research conducted on Punjab primary-level textbooks to identify divisive or biased content affecting children from diverse faith backgrounds. Research findings shared and discussed with civil society professionals and government officials, contributing to national dialogue on inclusive and peace-oriented educational curriculum and textbooks.*
- *Two Interfaith Harmony Committees established in Rawalpindi and Islamabad, comprising 45 members including Muslim, Christian, and Hindu religious leaders, as well as men, women, and youth.*

THEMATIC AREA: SOCIAL COHESION

SDG 16

Under the thematic area of Social Cohesion, WPTG Foundation (WPTGF) actively promotes interfaith harmony and peaceful coexistence. During the year 2024–25, WPTGF raised awareness among 602 community members, including children, parents, and teachers, on social cohesion, peaceful coexistence, and respect for religious diversity. As part of our advocacy efforts, WPTGF conducted a small-scale research study on Punjab primary-level textbooks to identify content that may contribute to division or bias among children from diverse faith backgrounds. The findings of this study were shared and discussed with civil society professionals and government officials in Pakistan, contributing to dialogue on inclusive and peace-oriented education.

In collaboration with Action for Impact, WPTGF implemented the project “Parenting Matters for Interfaith Harmony”, which focuses on educating parents and community members on nurturing values of acceptance, tolerance, and respect for people of different religions, sects, and beliefs. Given the lack of structured platforms in Pakistan that support parents in raising children who embrace diversity, this initiative addresses a critical gap.

To strengthen community-level engagement, WPTGF established two Interfaith Harmony Committees in Rawalpindi and Islamabad. These committees consist of 45 community members and families, including Muslim, Christian, and Hindu religious leaders, as well as men, women, and youth. The committees actively work to promote interfaith harmony within homes and neighbourhoods across the twin cities. WPTGF also engaged directly with children through structured activities aimed at transforming mindsets and fostering peaceful coexistence among individuals with diverse ideologies, religions, sects, and denominations. Overall, 602 children, parents, and community members were mobilized during the year to promote respect for people of different faiths.

In addition, WPTGF organized joint celebrations of Eid and Christmas and conducted an awareness session on Diwali to promote understanding of diverse religions in Pakistan and encourage mutual respect. Monthly interfaith harmony meetings were held with committee members, during which participants pledged to further mobilize their families and communities in support of interfaith harmony and peaceful coexistence.

THEMATIC AREA: CHURCH AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT SDG 1



- Development of a children's peace education storybook initiated titled "Once Upon a Time... Stories for Children: Promoting Peaceful Coexistence among Diverse Faith Children in Pakistan", originally written by a European writer Dr. Johannes Reimer aimed at nurturing values of acceptance and peaceful coexistence among children. The 10 Emerging Leaders engaged and capacitated to contextualize the stories into Pakistani version and write moral lessons based on peace values focused on compassion, respect, faithfulness, and love for neighbors. Planned use of the storybook in WPTGF's Non-Formal Education Centre and partner schools to promote inclusive values and positive social behavior among children.

THEMATIC AREA: CHURCH AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

SDG 1



- 145 children, women, and youth mobilized through 40 days prayers and fasting campaign for Pakistan and Japan for the promotion of peace and well-being in Pakistan and Japan. Awareness raised on global humanitarian concerns, including the issue of social isolation in Japan, while emphasizing the importance of family life and social connectedness.⁵¹ Christian women understanding enhanced on Christian Values and Women Protection in Pakistan through the Legal Expert Advocate of High Court reinforcing that the Constitution of Pakistan guarantees protection of women's rights.
- Youth Bible Study Program enabled 5 youth strengthen their spiritual understanding and moral reflection to complete their two months course covering 19 Chapters from the book of Genesis.
- The joined celebration of Christmas organized with Christians and Muslims brother and sisters and 50 vulnerable families provided Quilts, pillows and mattresses as Christmas Gifts.

PEACE EDUCATION STORYBOOK FOR NON-FORMAL EDUCATION CHILDREN:

WPTGF is in a process of developing a storybook for children "Once upon a time ...Stories for Children: Promoting Peaceful Coexistence among Diverse Faith Children in Pakistan on the values of peaceful coexistence. The stories are contextualized into Pakistani version from a European writer's storybook Dr. Johannes Reimer. WPTGF engaged 10 Emerging Leaders to contextualize 12 peace stories into Pakistani version. They delved into the stories deeply and wrote moral lessons from the stories as well. The stories are based on lessons of compassion, respect, faithfulness and loving thy neighbors. These stories will be published and used by WPTGF Non- Formal Education Centre and other school children to read it and acquire habits of acceptance and loving others.

PRAY FOR JAPAN AND PAKISTAN CAMPAIGN

We also conducted 6 prayer sessions with 145 children, women and youth for peace in Pakistan and Japan's peace and well being. According to BBC 40,000 people died alone in Japan in 2024. We also prayed for our homeland Pakistan peace and prosperity. The importance of family life which is extincting in some parts of the world. The youth and women have also fasted in these 40 days for Japan. The six sessions were conducted in Lakurti, Mughalabad, Dhoke Kala Khan and Burma Town.

Seminar on Christian Values & Women Protection Laws in Pakistan

WPTGF in collaboration with AWARD held a seminar on Christian Values & Women Protection Laws in Pakistan. During the session the 51 participants explored the essence of Christian values such as wisdom, faithfulness, perseverance, consistency, and the principle of loving thy neighbor. The speakers also explained in detail the women protection laws in Pakistan aiming to empower women and girls with the knowledge and confidence to thrive fearlessly in the country. The perspective of being faithful with their spouses was highly appreciated by women, As Ms. Asma Riaz the Advocate High Court deals with domestic criminal cases. She articulated Constitution of Pakistan is the mother law and it guarantees protection of women rights in the country. She further shared laws in Pakistan for women.

THEMATIC AREA: CHURCH AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT SDG 1

YOUTH BIBLE STUDY PROGRAM

WPTG Foundation in collaboration with Giving Hearts Foundation Inc. implemented the project “Youth Spiritual Strengthening by Full Bible Reading and Comprehension in Two Years”. A total of 5 youth attended the two months course and 19 chapters from the book of Genesis was covered.

CHRISTMAS JOINT CELEBRATION

WPTGF in collaboration with Action for Impact and LVB organization held Christmas party for community members. It was joint celebration as other religions’ community members also joined us. The children of Non-Formal Education Centre (NFEC) sang carols and performed dances on auspicious occasion. Ms. Kiran Peter, the Executive Director of WPTGF, Ms. Zartasha Niazi the Chief Executive Officer of AFI and Pastor Danial Bashir wished the guests, children and community members a joyful and blessed Christmas and New Year.

DISTRIBUTION OF QUILTS AS CHRISTMAS GIFTS

WPTGF in collaboration with Alkhidmat Foundation distributed quilts, pillows and beds mats among 50 beneficiaries on December 19, 2024 as gifts. The gifts were distributed among households earning maximum monthly income PKR 40,000 and living on rented houses. The widows were given preference to avail the gifts. We are so happy that the community members appreciated the gifts and efforts of WPTGF.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

THEMATIC AREA: PROMOTION OF EDUCATION SDG 4



Since July 2023, WPTG Foundation's Non-Formal Education Centre has educated 90 out-of-school children, with 60% successfully transitioning into formal schools through parental and community awareness on education as a pathway out of poverty and peaceful societies. In the year 24-25, 20 children have been enrolled in the mainstream schools. Peace education was integrated into learning through sessions based on values from the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. Children were also equipped with non-violent conflict resolution skills, including compromise, collaboration, withdrawal, competition, and accommodation, with a strong emphasis on dialogue and peaceful problem-solving.

THEMATIC AREA: PROMOTION OF EDUCATION

SDG 4



WPTG Foundation is teaching out of school children since July 2023. We have taught 90 children until now and 60% of them are now studying in schools. The 60% children are in school because we conduct awareness sessions on the significance of education to come out of poverty and the formulation of a peaceful society. We also give peace education to children by holding a session of values mentioned in Universal Declaration of Human Rights and also the tool of conflict resolution such as compromise, collaboration, withdrawal, competition and avoidance. We help children understand the importance of having dialogues to resolve conflict non-violently and conflict as an inevitable phenomenon which happens when we interact. We share with children that conflict is neither positive nor negative, it depends how we deal with it. The age range of these children is 4 to 14. We are helping them to explore what they want to become when they grow up. The children are also encouraged to think positively and take care of the creation all around them because we humans are stewards of this universe.

We build capacity of children by celebrating important days such as Pakistan independence day, last we celebrated 77th Independence day of Pakistan on August 14, 2024 with the children.. The students were encouraged to love their country and always strive to build it up. The students sang national songs and got motivated to love diversity in Pakistan.

Similarly, in collaboration with Saanj Preet organization we formulated a Child Protection Committee for Lalkurti and its nearby areas and formulated a Child Protection Children's Committee to create awareness on treating children with respect and dignity and not doing violence and using abusive language at household level for children.

THEMATIC AREA: PROMOTION OF EDUCATION SDG 4



Ms. Rahib Asif is studying in BS Finance and Accounting from National University of Modern Languages, Rawalpindi (NUML) under WPTG Foundation's Scholarship Program. She has successfully passed her fourth semesters and now studying her 7th semester. She is also member of our Youth Network, we have found her very intelligent, confident and hardworking individual. We are thankful to Mr. Mark from Australia for supporting us in this regard.

In the year 24-25, WPTG Foundation held a vocational courses for women on Sewing and Stitching. A total of 10 women completed their six months course. The women were provided certificates upon the completion of the courses by WPTGF. After the completion of courses the women are being provided mentoring sessions to earn income from the learnt skill. We are also in connection with 15 women who completed their course on Beautician with us in year 23-24. They are also encouraged to keep updating themselves and further harnessing their skills by doing advance courses as well.

After the completion of their internship program the youth gets an intership letter to apply to different organizations. The qualification of these youth is BS and Intermediate.
